

James 1:19-20: "My dear brothers and sisters, take note of this: Everyone should be quick to listen, slow to speak and slow to become angry, because human anger does not produce the righteousness that God desires."

Key Greek Word:

"Quick to Listen (ταχύς εἰς τὸ ἀκούειν, tachys eis to akouein) - [takh-oos ice to ah-KOO-ine]: Indicates an eagerness to listen that precedes speaking and reacting."

Historical Context:

"Written to early Christians, emphasizing restraint and patience in communication, countering prevalent rash behavior."

Discussion of the Verse:

"This verse highlights the spiritual discipline of listening over speaking and controlling anger to foster peace and righteousness."

Practical Applications:

- Practice active listening in daily conversations.
- Pause before responding to ensure thoughtful communication.
- Implement anger management techniques to promote calmness.
